RE: Jail Health Services

Background:

Through RCW 70.48.130, the legislature requires that all jail inmates receive appropriate and cost-effective emergency and necessary medical care. The RCW also requires governing units, the health care authority, and medical care providers to cooperate to achieve the best rates consistent with adequate care.

Whatcom County Corrections follows a 'community standard medical, dental, and mental health care to inmates' simply defined as if an inmate can access care in a community such as preventative care then corrections will provide it. Whatcom County Corrections is an accredited facility through the National Commission on Correctional Healthcare standards (NCCHC).

Currently the Whatcom County Corrections Division contracts out to multiple providers for jail health services for main jail inmates, work center work release individuals, and youth detainees in Juvenile Detention. This involves 16 different contracts for services such as nursing, medical oversight, lab services, medication, faxing, medical record system, accounts payable/accounts receivable, and dental care.

Whatcom County currently budgets \$3,651,492 for jail health services.¹

Jail health services served an average of 275 inmates per day and total bookings of 3747 in 2024:

- Main Jail: 2024 average daily population of 180²
 - Operational capacity is 211
- Work Center: 2024 average daily population of 95
 - Operational capacity is 148
- Juvenile Detention: 2024 average daily population of 6, with 232 youth bookings.

¹ Of interest is an additional \$881,977 is spent through Whatcom County Health and Community services to provide behavioral health services that include re-entry services. Combined total budgets = \$4,533,469.

² This data reflects the population with booking restrictions. In February 2025, booking restrictions were removed and the average daily population will increase. Operational capacity in the main jail is 211.

Current situation:

Northwest Regional Council (NWRC) is terminating nursing services on June 30, 2025. NWRC leadership is committed to assist us in a smooth transition.

NWRC provides:

- 12.63 full time employee equivalents (FTE) to provide nursing care:
 - o 1 RN Supervisor, 1 RN lead, 6.63 RN, 3 LPN, 1 Medical Assistant, 1 Care Coordinator
- Main Jail: 7 days a week between 7am and 9pm
- Work Center: Tuesday Friday 4 to 6 hours a day
- Juvenile Detention: flex

Approach to a solution:

Our offices are meeting weekly and working collaboratively to analyze options and solutions leading up to a discussion before County Council for discussion on March 11, 2025.

The National Center for Correctional Healthcare Resources (NCCHC) provided a preliminary assessment on perspective models in January. Many jails in Washington State contract out for comprehensive health services to a 3rd party vendor, others contract with local healthcare systems, and some provide services through county government departments like public health or corrections.

Jill Boudreau, Senior Policy and Project Manager in the Executive's Office has been tasked with further analysis and facilitation of an internal leadership group that includes the Sheriffs Office, Executives Office, Superior Court administration and juvenile detention, Health and Community Services, Human Resources, and Finance.

We already know that we need to hire a Healthcare Authority FTE (Corrections Health Program Manager) regardless of chosen direction.

Questions to be answered by the leadership group include:

- 1. What is responsible to do given the circumstances, timeframe and budget
- 2. What gives Whatcom County the most flexibility to provide services based on Whatcom County values, accreditation, and need
- 3. What consideration of the new jail project needs to be incorporated as part of this decision
- 4. What best protects Whatcom County from liability
- 5. What structure can ensure collaboration between all County leaders and departments
- 6. Who is responsible for implementation, and what support do they need

Models we are researching:

In-house: Bring nursing staff employees in-house as Whatcom County employees

- Requires Sheriff, Executive and County Council concurrence/action
- Oversight: Sheriff's Department, Bureau of Corrections
- Requires civil service process
- Requires a Healthcare Authority FTE, Corrections Health Program Manager

 NWRC assists in transition and provides turnkey operational documents, retain program policies, schedule, medical protocol, and current contracts for other companion services such as physician oversight, lab services, medication services.

3rd party: Release a request for proposals (RFP) to 3rd party contractor to provide jail health services including medical, dental, and mental health care. A contract could include Juvenile Detention or a separate service unique to youth.

- Requires Sheriff, Executive and County Council concurrence/action
- Requires a Healthcare Authority FTE, Corrections Health Program Manager
- Decision on incorporating juvenile detention needs or separate out
- RFP may not be successful to find willing contractor
- Further conversation is needed to define behavioral health services appropriate for a 3rd party contract and what makes sense to offer outside of a contractor. For example, re-entry services would not be combined with a medical services contract.

IMPORTANT NOTE: We have identified the need to work concurrently on both solutions. If the preferred structure is recommended to be a 3rd party contract, the need for a Request for Proposals (RFP) will take time, and there is no guarantee there will be an interested contractor, resulting in the need for Whatcom County to be ready to bring nursing services in-house.

Research as been completed on both models that include 5 other Washington State counties: Skagit, Snohomish, Chelan, Kitsap, and Clark. The table below displays information to compare.
