- 2 The meeting was called to order by Whatcom County Planning Commission Chair,
- 3 Kelvin Barton at 6:00 p.m.
- 4 Roll Call

- 8 Suneeta Eisenberg left the meeting at 8:23p
- 9 Staff Present: Mark Personius, Lucas Clark, Lauren Templeton, Lauren Clemens,
- 10 Lauren Smith, Jennifer Hayden, Sue Sullivan, and Aileen Kogut-Aguon
- 11 Department Update
- 12 Mark Personius, Director of Planning and Development Services (PDS), provided
- 13 information on the topics being presented tonight and spoke on the City of Blaine's
- proposal being cancelled and will have Alex Wenger, City of Blaine CDS Director, speak
- on the reasoning during the Open Session for Public Comment.
- 16 Mr. Personius then gave a schedule update for the next few meetings:
 - October 23rd: Chapter 8 Resource Lands Public Hearing
 - October 30th: Annual Code Scrub Public Hearing / Continuation of UGA Proposals: Sumas, Nooksack, Birch Bay, Columbia Valley, Cherry Point, Everson
 - November 5th: Briefing and Discussion to Council Committee of the Whole on the Planning Commission-Recommended Chapter 12 Climate.
 - November 6th: Chapter 2 Land Use / UGA Proposals: Bellingham, Ferndale. The City of Blaine UGA Proposal is tentatively planned for this meeting.

Open Session Public Comment

- 25 Alex Wenger, Director for the City of Blaine's Community Development Services (CDS),
- 26 addressed the Commission about their reasons for withdrawing their proposal. He
- 27 explained that the decision was made to allow additional time to coordinate with
- 28 neighboring areas including Birch Bay, and to resolve certain issues that have come
- 29 up. Mr. Wenger noted that the City Council has directed city staff to find a way to bring
- 30 the Semiahmoo Highlands property into the Urban Growth Area (UGA). The City of
- 31 Blaine will likely revise their proposal to not have a "UGA Swap" which they will be
- 32 working with County staff on. Additionally, with the upcoming east Blaine de-
- 33 annexation ballot measure on November 4th, it will dictate where the city goes with
- their UGA proposal and will wait to see the results of the ballot measure.

- 2 Commissioner Greif noted this is the second last-minute cancelation from Blaine on
- 3 their UGA proposal and stated the repeated cancellations show lack of respect for the
- 4 Commission and members of the public who attend the meetings to provide public
- 5 comment.
- 6 Commissioner Hansen provided a notification of activities, reporting that he spoke with
- 7 the Whatcom County Under-Sheriff about the capacity that the Sheriff's Department
- 8 has to address additional population in the Columbia Valley. He noted they have a
- 9 satellite station in the area with two dedicated deputies seven days a week.
- 10 Commissioner Browne expressed his frustration with what is going on in the City of
- 11 Blaine because 11 years ago when he was on Council, discussions with Blaine took
- 12 place regarding infrastructure development in the Eastern part of the city. As a
- councilmember, he went forward with Blaine, proposing a mechanism for funding the
- 14 infrastructure, addressing the city's barrier to completing the annexation and
- expansion. He noted the City of Blaine failed to follow through on the opportunity and
- 16 is now talking about de-annexing that part of the city and redirecting their activities
- 17 elsewhere.
- 18 Approval of Meeting Minutes

- 26 Open Space Application
- 27 Timestamp: 6:31p
- 28 Lauren Templeton, Conservation Easement Program (CEP) Administrator, provided a
- 29 brief overview of the Open Space Program application process, explaining that
- 30 properties are evaluated based on public benefit criteria, including ecological value,
- 31 recreation, and public access. She explained the difference between the Designated
- 32 Forestland (DFL) and Open Space Farm & Agricultural Land (OSAG) programs, the
- 33 Open Space Land (OSL) and Open Space Farm & Agricultural Conservation Land
- 34 (OSFAC) requires the property to have public access. However; the Council may waive
- 35 public access requirement for known habitat of endangered species, known
- archeological sites, or wetland conservation.
- 37 Ms. Templeton outlined the Public Benefit Rating System (PBRS). This system
- 38 considers natural resources such as streams, wetlands, scenic vistas, recreation, and
- 39 educational opportunities.
- 40 The application being presented for a public hearing is for OSP2025-001-Stevens. The
- PBRS score is 50.87. The property is approximately 30 acres located south of Everson
- 42 in Rural zoning. It contains mapped wetlands, mature forest up to over 100-year trees

- 1 and a seasonal stream that runs through the property. Whatcom Land Trust has a
- 2 conservation easement across the majority of the property for its wetland conservation
- 3 values. Both Whatcom Land Trust and the property owner have requested a waiver of
- 4 public access to protect those resources. Staff is recommending approval of this
- 5 application.
- 6 Commissioners asked clarifying questions about the multiple parcels part of the
- 7 application, property tax part of the benefits for the program, and how much of the
- 8 property is under conservation easement currently.
- 9 Commissioner Greif asked about the public benefits when the property owner does not
- 10 want to allow public access.
- 11 Ms. Templeton stated that part of the public benefit are the conservation easements
- 12 that cover the wetland areas of the property. She noted that the owners have agreed
- 13 to have educational opportunities and hosting public events in a more structured
- 14 fashion.

- 1 2025 Comprehensive Plan Update Chapter 5: Utilities
- 2 Timestamp: 7:03p
- 3 Lucas Clark, PDS Long Range Planner, provided an overview on Chapter 5: Utilities of
- 4 the 2025 Comprehensive Plan Update. He explained that "utilities" encompasses all
- 5 lines and facilities used to distribute, collect, transmit, or control electric power, natural
- 6 gas, petroleum, telecommunications, water and sewage. Most non-regional utilities are
- 7 operated by special districts, private companies, or cities. Mr. Clark noted that utilities
- 8 such as electricity, natural gas, and petroleum are inherently regional in nature and
- 9 are regulated at the county, state and federal levels.
- 10 The intent of this chapter is to support utility providers in meeting their public service
- obligations required by state law; to ensure reliable service to existing and future
- 12 customers; and minimize negative impacts on residents, infrastructure, and the
- 13 environment.
- 14 c) Chapter 5: Utilities Public Hearing

- 17 d) Work Session
- 18 Timestamp: 7:10p
- 19 Commissioner Moceri asked to speak on policy 5C-10 and 5C-11 on page 5-6 and what
- 20 the differences are because they seem to say the same thing.
- 21 Commissioner Greif asked to explain symmetrical service.
- 22 Mr. Clark stated that symmetrical service means upload and download speeds are the
- 23 same. Oftentimes, download speeds are faster and upload speeds are slower. One of
- 24 the goals of Washington State Commerce in their BEAD Act (Broadband Equity Access)
- is to have one gigabyte symmetrical service.
- 26 Mr. Clark answered Commissioner Moceri's question, stating the difference between
- 27 policies 5C-10 and 5C-11, is that 5C-11 speaks to equity, whereas 5C-10 speaks to
- 28 generally broadband service throughout the county.
- 29 **4Commissioner Greif moved** to strike 5C-10 and amend 5C-11 to say "Support
- 30 equitable broadband access, affordability, and quality for all residents and businesses,
- 31 with a target of 1 GBPS symmetrical service throughout the County.
- 32 Commissioner Eisenberg seconded.
- 33 The Commission was in consensus. The motion carried.

- 7 non-consumptive water in certain areas of the county.
- 8 The motion was withdrawn.

- 11 Policy 5S-2.
- 12 Commission Chair Barton recognized: Kaia Hayes, from WRIA-1 Planning Unit.
- 13 Ms. Hayes explained that the suggested goal addition came from overall discussion on
- 14 the chapter and the intent is to ensure that water availability and planning align with
- 15 the county's long-term land use vision, rather than allowing water constraints alone to
- 16 dictate growth patterns.
- 17 Commissioner Greif asked about overall cell phone services and the lack of good
- 18 coverage throughout the county.
- 19 **7Commissioner Greif moved** to add Policy 5C-12 to say "Actively encourage and
- 20 coordinate with wireless carriers to expand and upgrade cellular voice and data
- 21 networks countywide, ensuring reliable coverage in all communities and along major
- 22 transportation corridors."
- 23 Commissioner Dunne seconded.
- 24 The Commission was in consensus. The motion carried.

- 26 **8Commissioner Browne moved** to add:
- 27 Policy 5S-5 Establish economic, physical and legal feasibility of redirecting surplus
- 28 fresh water above the required minimum instream flow from the mouth of the
- 29 Nooksack to AG operations and urban growth areas that lack adequate legal water.
- 30 Policy 5S-6 Identify potential utility corridors to install pipelines to transport surplus
- 31 fresh water above the required minimum instream flow from the mouth of the
- 32 Nooksack ensure future development does not prohibit utilizing these corridors.
- 33 Policy 5S-7 Identify and advocate for funding to redirect surplus fresh water above
- 34 the required minimum instream flow from the mouth of the Nooksack for AG and other
- 35 uses.
- 36 Commissioner Dunne seconded.
- 37 Ms. Hayes asked a clarifying question about the proposed policy additions and the
- 38 surplus surface water.

- 1 Commissioner Browne clarified that the policy is for the freshwater in the Nooksack
- 2 that mixes in with saltwater, at which point it becomes part of the seawater.
- 3 Mr. Personius stated in the instream flow rule for the Nooksack river, there is a
- 4 reserved amount of water that the Department of Ecology has determined necessary
- 5 for fish, wildlife in the river. Therefore, at certain periods of time, there is no surplus.
- 6 Mr. Personius suggested amending the language to specify "surplus above minimum"
- 7 instream flows".
- 8 Commissioner Browne accepted the friendly amendment.
- 9 Roll Call Vote: Ayes- Greif, Van Dalen, Browne, Dunne, Barton
- 10 Nays- Hansen, Moceri, Eisenberg
- 11 (Ayes- 5; Nays- 3; Abstain- 0). The motion carried.
