WHATCOM CHIEF

- 16-car vessel (often 20)
- Built 1962
- End of design life 2029
- Diesel propulsion
- Not ADA compliant

NEW FERRY

- 34-car vessel
- Enters service 2027
- Diesel Battery Hybrid
- All-electric by 2035
- Ferry \$15 million
- Terminals \$14.5 million

FUNDING

- \$30 million over 7 years OR
- \$33 million over 15 years
- Ferry District Property Tax
- CRAB Funding
- FHWA Ferry Grant
- Fare Surcharge

BENEFITS

- Coast Guard + ADA Compliance
- Minimize Carbon Footprint
- Meets 56% Ridership Increase over 40 years
