In this role, I oversee direct client services while also working on broader food systems advocacy to ensure people have dignified access to food. My work spans from day-to-day operations to building community partnerships that strengthen our local food network and increase resilience in underserved areas. I'm an active member of the Foothills Community Food Partnership (FCFP), where I contribute data and insights about food insecurity trends in our region and help develop long-term food access planning.
