Review of Requirements



HB 1220 amended the GMA in 2021 to require that jurisdictions "plan for and accommodate housing affordable to **all economic segments** of the population of the state"



Commerce HAPT tool generates **total Countywide need** by income band based on population projections.



Housing targets by income band are then **allocated** to UGAs and Rural & Resource Lands based on shares of countywide growth. Employment targets were also developed by the County and Leland Consulting Group.



Jurisdictions must show **land capacity** to accommodate the units and employment targets through zoning.





Land Capacity by Income Band

- Cities and County must show capacity for units that meet allocations at each income level
- Capacity is correlated with zoning:
 - Lowest-income households (0-80% AMI) served by deeply subsidized housing in areas zoned for medium to large scale multifamily development.
 - Moderate-income households (80-120% AMI) served by apartments and smaller "middle housing" types such as 2-3-4-plexes.
 - Higher-income households (120% AMI+) served by single-family detached housing.
 - ADUs and Middle Housing can serve a range of moderate incomes.
- Not all housing will build-out at these income levels, but jurisdictions must demonstrate that these housing types can be built under current or proposed zoning to meet targets.









Land Capacity for Permanent Housing - Methodology

- Initially developed for Buildable Lands process, updated for Comprehensive Planning process
- Targets developed using modified Housing for All Planning Tool and adopted by Resolution 2025-011
- Parcel data provided by County, with supplemental zoning and updates provided by cities.

Process:

- Select Assumed Densities
- Assemble Net Developable Land Inventory
- Estimate Housing and Employment Capacity
- Evaluate Land Capacity

Land Capacity for Permanent Housing - Process

Select Assumed Densities

 Comprehensive plan designations and planned densities, zoning, and achieved densities are factors that local governments consider when selecting assumed future densities.

Assemble Net Developable Land Inventory

- Classification: Vacant, Partially-Used, Underutilized (County)
- Deduct Critical Areas, Public Uses, Infrastructure Gaps, Market Factor

Estimate Housing and Employment Capacity

- Multiply net available acreage by density assumptions
- Assign zones to income bands based on housing typologies

Evaluate Land Capacity

• If there is a deficit, analyze how to address through land use changes (i.e. densification) or potential expansion.

Land Capacity for Permanent Housing - Comments

- Comments received from Futurewise, Whatcom Association of Realtors, Building Industry Association of Whatcom County, Jones Engineers, Carmichael Clark, P.S., ReSources, and Port of Bellingham.
- Concerns voiced over density assumptions, infrastructure gaps, market factor reductions, coordination between jurisdictions, feasibility of various housing types and income levels, and critical areas.
- Updates to methodology were made as well as a detailed comment response letter.
- Stakeholders attended a virtual meeting to review Land Capacity Analysis (LCA) sheets in June 2025.
- The Whatcom County Planning Commission held a public hearing on the Methodologies in July 2025.

Land Capacity for Emergency Housing - Methodology

 Guidance developed by Commerce to ensure sufficient capacity for Emergency Housing based on new legislative requirements.

Process:

- Identify zone acreage where Emergency Housing and Shelter are allowed based on LCA sheets.
 - Take into account any spacing or intensity requirements
- Develop assumptions for what type of Emergency Housing or Shelter is likely to be built in these zones
 - Emergency Housing sheets contain suggested densities based on Commerce guidance and Whatcom Health Department data
- Calculate capacity and compare with target.

Land Capacity for Emergency Housing - Comments

- Comments received from Futurewise, Carmichael Clark, P.S., and ReSources.
- Concerns voiced over double counting of land for permanent and emergency housing needs, definitions of emergency housing, permanent supportive housing, and duration of emergency housing during the planning period
- Updates to methodology were made as well as a detailed comment response letter.
- Stakeholders attended a virtual meeting to review LCA sheets.
