RE: Application for Appointment to Whatcom County Advisory Groups

To the Whatcom County Wildlife Advisory Committee:

The Lummi Nation and Lummi people are original inhabitants of Washington's northernmost coast. We are fishers, hunters, gatherers and harvesters of nature's abundance and have been since time immemorial. We envision our homeland as a place where we enjoy an abundant, safe, and healthy life in mind, body, society, environment, space, time, and spirituality. The Point Elliott Treaty of 1855 ceded the original lands of the Lummi people, including what is now known as Whatcom County. The tribes agreed to settle on a reservation as defined by the Point Elliott Treaty in an exchange for sovereign rights that include the right to take fish at usual and accustomed grounds and stations and together with the privilege of hunting and gathering roots and berries on open and unclaimed lands. The Treaty established tribal sovereignty for managing its people and their way of life, which includes enhancing, managing, and protecting the natural resources of the Lummi people into perpetuity for the benefit of Lummi tribal members.

The purpose of the Whatcom County Wildlife Advisory Committee (WAC) is to advise the County Planning and Development services on the value of wildlife and habitat management issues in accordance with the Comprehensive Plan formally published in 2017 and now being updated in 2024. Also, the purpose of the Committee is to integrate wildlife management and protection into Whatcom County's community planning process as well as to protect and enhance ecosystems that support native fish and wildlife populations and habitat.

Lummi Natural Resources (LNR) gained greater capacity for managing wildlife resources and habitats in 2022 by starting a Wildlife Program. The mission of the Wildlife Program is to defend and protect treaty rights related to wildlife management, hunting, and gathering, as well as maximize and protect wildlife, hunting, and gathering resources and opportunities. The LNR Wildlife Program manager, Emily Wirtz, was hired in 2022 with 12 years of experience working with wildlife programs for Western Washington Tribes and 9 years of experience working with Point Elliott Treaty Tribes. The LNR Policy Representative, Frank Bob, formally a WAC member recommended her involvement with the Whatcom County WAC to ensure that the Tribe's treaty protected wildlife resources and culturally significant wildlife species are being considered for WAC meetings, plans, and operations.

Emily Wirtz, the LNR Wildlife Program Manager, will accept the nomination if the Committee selects her for a tribal representative seat.

Thank you for including tribal representation in the County planning process as the Tribe is an important government and manager within the County as well as one of the largest.
