### 1a. Description of request:

In 2025 the Sheriff's Office was awarded \$125,000 from the Attorney General's Office. (Supplemental Budget #4963) This funding is a result of a lawsuit that the Attorney General's Office brought against Federal Way Discount Guns and its owner after they illegally sold high-capacity magazines to the public. The case ultimately settled and the Court entered a Consent Decree that allowed the Attorney General to distribute a portion of the settlement funds cy press to local law enforcement agencies, who applied, to assist in promoting firearms safety, combating gun violence, and supporting victims of gun violence.

None of the funding was used in 2025, bringing forth all \$125,000 to 2026.

The U.S. Department of Justice Drug Enforcement Administration provided \$16,500 from State and Local Overtime (SLOT) Funds for the FY26 year (WCC#202601012). \$2,657.54 was invoiced in 2025, leaving \$13,842.46 for 2026.

**1a. Description of request:**

Health and Community Services (HCS) was awarded a Healthy Shorelines grant from Puget Sound Partnership. HCS will spend funds in 2026 to develop a source control business inspection program to comply with the most recently added requirements of the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Municipal Stormwater Permit. Source control Best Management Practices (BMPs) are prescribed in the most current version of the Stormwater Management Manual for Western Washington. The key objectives of the proposal are:

1. Contract with a subject matter expert to perform source control BMP inspections for businesses within the NPDES boundary.
2. Develop procedures and tasks for staff to perform ongoing inspections for the program.
3. Develop and identify job descriptions for inspectors.
4. Identify applicable certifications, courses and provide training to staff.
5. Develop data management infrastructure.
6. Develop a communications strategy and plan.

The grant will pay for staff time that is already included in the HCS budget.

**1b. Primary customers:**

Whatcom county residents.

**2. Problem to be solved:**

Shoreline and habitat issues being addressed: Pollution, sedimentation, temperature, erosion, and flow issues.

Whatcom County can eliminate unanticipated discharges into the County's Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) and into Birch Bay and Bellingham Bay. The community benefits include education and outreach. There is also enhanced benefits with our existing partnerships with Lummi and Nooksack tribes in protecting water quality for salmon habitat. Enhanced water quality benefits salmon populations, their vital food source and treaty-protected resource, and are a foundation of cultural identity and livelihood.

**3a. Options / Advantages:**

Compliance with NPDES is federally mandated. This option leverages grant funds to support compliance.

Minimize mitigation measures and reduced risk of fines with enhanced and restored shoreline and habitat.

**1a. Description of request:**

The Washington State Military Department and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security awarded Whatcom County a FFY2024 State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) grant (wcc#202601029) in the amount of \$47,479 to support the County's efforts to prevent terrorism and prepare against threats and hazards. \$37,435 in budget authority is in the process of being transferred from the FFY2023 State Homeland Security grant (wcc#202406008). Therefore, we ask budget authority totaling \$10,044.

**1b. Primary customers:**

Whatcom County residents and visitors.

**2. Problem to be solved:**

This grant will fund preparedness activities, including planning, training, exercises, and the purchase of supplies and equipment to prevent terrorism and prepare against threats and hazards.

### 1a. Description of request:

Parks has been working on the renovation of the Van Zandt Community Hall for the past year and the project is near completion. In December of 2025 a contract amendment with Summit Construction was executed using available budget within the project to fund repairs to building damage that were unknown when the project was bid. Damage included rotting floor joists and subfloor, wall studs, and roofing members. The contract was executed and the work has been substantially completed.

The reason for this request is the result of an administrative error that has resulted in the loss the budget authority for the contract amendment in the amount of \$55,000.

### 1b. Primary customers:

Residents and visitors to Whatcom County are the primary customers for this effort. The Van Zandt Community Hall is highly utilized by the local community as demonstrated through attendance of entertainment and educational events hosted by the South Fork Valley Community Association (SFVCA). Some community members arrive at the Hall by way of public transportation and will benefit from improved accessibility.

### 2. Problem to be solved:

Although the contract amendment with Summit Construction was fully executed in early December, the Purchase Order Change form was not processed. As a result, when continuing appropriation amounts were finalized, the open balance on the PO did not reflect the additional \$55,000 authorized under the amendment. Because of this, the budget authority tied to the amendment was not carried forward into 2026.

The work is substantially complete, with final invoicing expected shortly. Parks is requesting re-appropriation of the budget authority to ensure we are able to pay the contractor for completed work, for which the County is contractually obligated to pay.

### 3a. Options / Advantages:

This work has already been approved, budget for, and completed. Because of an administrated error, we are asking for the budget authority to be reinstated in 2026.

### 1a. Description of request:

This project includes completing office improvements and HVAC upgrades at the park headquarters campus located at 3373 Mt Baker Hwy. These improvements are needed to 1) replace aging oil/gas-fired furnaces that are at the end of their serviceable lifespan, and 2) complete tenant improvements in order to accommodate additional staffing approved through the mid-year biennium, Ordinance 2023-068, AB2023-729. This amendment supplements a project that was previously approved through Ordinance 2023-014, AB2023-185.

### 1b. Primary customers:

Park staff and the visiting public are the primary customers of this project, however described office improvements are needed to efficiently deliver park and system-wide recreational services to Whatcom county residents.

### 2. Problem to be solved:

Whatcom County Parks & Recreation has been working on facility upgrades at the Parks Administrative complex over the past year. In December, a contract amendment was executed with Summit Construction, the project's primary contractor, to complete a roof replacement at the Parks Annex. During the course of the project, budget tracking issues resulted in insufficient budget authority to fully cover the cost of the amendment. The Summit Construction contract is scheduled to expire on March 31, 2026, and the roof replacement work was completed in January. As a result, Parks requested continuing appropriations for the remaining value of the contract. During the continuing appropriations review, it was determined that available budget authority was sufficient to continue only \$59,593.53 of the contract. This leaves an outstanding balance of \$12,819.57 for completed work that currently lacks budget authority for payment. Several factors contributed to this situation, including the complexity of the project, which led to multiple budget transfers, contract amendments, and project expenditures occurring in object accounts that were not originally planned. Parks Administrative Staff Members are reviewing internal budget tracking processes and coordinating with Finance to address the outstanding balance and strengthen controls for future capital projects.

No other options exist as the County is obligated to paying the costs of the work with the associated contract.

### 1a. Description of request:

In 2019 the State of Washington passed the Clean Building Program (HB 1257) which was expanded in 2022 (SB 5722) requiring Tier 1 and Tier 2 buildings to complete energy use benchmarking and subsequent implementation of Energy Use Management Plans and Operations and Maintenance Programs.

-Tier 1 buildings (greater than 220,000 sf) must meet Energy Use Intensity (EUI) targets on June 1st, 2026. This includes the combination of the Public Safety Building and Courthouse (required to be considered as one building as they are connected by a skybridge). Additionally, an Energy Use Management Plan and Operations and Maintenance Program must be in place.

-Tier 1 Buildings (between 90,001 sf and 220,000 sf) must meet EUI targets by June 1, 2027. The County does not have a facility of this size.

-Tier 1 Buildings (between 50,001 sf and 90,000 sf) must meet EUI targets by June 1, 2028. The County does not have a facility of this size.

-Tier 2 Buildings (between 20,001 sf and 50,000 sf) must complete energy use benchmarking and implement an Energy Management Plan and Operations and Maintenance Program by July 1, 2027. These buildings are not currently required to meet specific EUI targets. The Jail Work Center, Waystation, Civic Center, Anne Deacon Center, and Northwest Annex are in this category.

In order to comply with these standards, the County must perform benchmarking and audits of our facilities that fall within these thresholds. This evaluation needs to be performed by Energy Services consultants. Facilities has contracted with Hargis to complete this work. Benchmarking is nearly complete and preparation of the required Energy Management Plans and Operations and Management has commenced.

Facilities applied for a grant offered by Washington State Association of Counties. Whatcom County was awarded a grant of \$449,882.29, which was based on a formula of cost/sf offered in the grant. This is a reimbursable grant that will be used to reimburse the County for the consulting work and audits.

Since grant funding does not cover actual facility upgrades, future funding may be required for:

- Engineering and procurement efforts beyond planning and budgeting.
- Capital improvements necessary to meet energy performance targets.
- Ongoing compliance monitoring and reporting beyond the grant period.

### 1b. Primary customers:

A State mandate with the earliest deadline occurring on June 1, 2026. This work will provide the data and documentation required to comply.
