
Increasing our visibility and accessibility as a community resource

Connecting with the Homeless

For the third year in a row, the WDRC proudly participated in Project Homeless Connect (PHC).
Sponsored by United Way, PHC is a one day event designed to provide individuals and families experiencing homelessness with immediate access to a full suite of supportive services.



In 2018, guests at PHC could access services from dental exams and vision screenings, to haircuts, pet care, and legal counsel. Thanks to WDRC staff and volunteers, conflict coaching and information about mediation was also available!

Connecting through the Arts

In partnership with Make.Shift, Western Washington University's Prevention and Wellness Services, and local artists, the WDRC was pleased to offer a training on de-escalation and conflict resolution in June of 2018.

Connecting in Our Neighborhoods

Supported by a Project Neighborly grant from the Whatcom Community Foundation, the WDRC provided nine "Comfort with Conflict" workshops to Bellingham neighborhood associations. By equipping people with the skills to communicate across differences, we aimed to help the neighborhood associations become spaces that welcome, include, and reflect the diversity of Bellingham's residents.

The "Comfort with Conflict" workshops offered neighborhood residents the opportunity to normalize the presence of conflict in their lives, to talk about the conflicts they face, and to begin to have difficult conversations with one another. Through the nine workshops, we reached over 80 people. As one training participant told us, "I can't speak highly enough of this workshop! We've had contentious meetings before and I think these tools are perfect for future dialogues and a harmonious neighborhood!"



Ultimately, the project not only strengthened participants' personal skills in addressing conflict, but also increased community awareness about the resources available to support people and groups experiencing conflict. We're pleased to report that the workshops have led to a marked increase in the number of people accessing mediation and conflict resolution services!

RELATIONSHIPS

Maintaining exemplary services and strong partnerships to magnify our impact.

Partnering with Juvenile Court

The Youth Program has a long running partnership with Juvenile Court, supporting youth in diversion and supervision by facilitating monthly workshops. In May of 2018, we received a request to begin a pilot project with the Juvenile Detention School. In early June, WDRC staff began leading a weekly class in the Detention School. The classes are interactive, with small group discussions based on conflict resolution curriculum.




The Detention School classes encourage the students to explore topics such as fighting, arguments, peer pressure, stigma, and underlying needs. Youth have begun to share openly about their beliefs and past experiences, describing frankly the way that social respect is linked to violence in their peer groups. These discussions are successful at incorporating conflict resolution curriculum and conflict coaching to support youth in exploring alternatives to violence.

Now, the students enthusiastically ask detention staff when WDRC staff will be coming in. The detention teachers have said that the discussions are helpful and supportive to the students' learning and development. After one session, the teachers remarked that they had never heard the students open up so much about their street gang culture, the perpetuation of violence, and their core need for respect. We were able to extend the pilot throughout the whole summer and the school year, so more youth will benefit from the learning and reflection that come from this partnership.

Partnering with Department of Social & Human Services

Funds from the Department of Social & Human Services (DSHS) make it possible for the WDRC to provide free supervised visitation for parents who are otherwise prohibited, by court order, from seeing their children. Below is the story of one of the 55 parents the WDRC served in 2018.

Dean came to the WDRC after he was ordered to have supervised visits with his 3 children. Their ages ranged from 4 months to 5 years. When they saw their father for the first time in many months, the 5 year old and the 2 year old ran to him and hugged him. Dean took the baby out of her carrier, held her, talked softly and calmed her. He managed to rock his baby, play with his 2 year old, and have a conversation with his 5 year old while she colored and drew pictures. Dean and his kids had multiple visits like this, during which their relationships grew. The kids called the visits, "Daddy Day." Eventually, they were able to begin unsupervised visits and no longer needed the WDRC's services!

PERMANENT PLACE FOR PEAC

After more than 13 years at our location on the corner of Prospect and Bay Streets, the WDRC learned we needed to move. One of our highest priorities was finding a location close to Bellingham's downtown core.

After a lengthy search, we were thrilled to have the opportunity to purchase and renovate the historic building at 206 Prospect Street. The new building enables the WDRC to remain close to other services, partner organizations, and the courts, and accessible by public transit.

The new space makes it possible to expand our services in several key ways:

- A larger training space for bigger and more frequent workshops, community conversations and dialogues;
- More mediation and conference rooms, allowing us to serve more clients, and to serve them more efficiently and responsively;
- ADA compliance throughout; and
- The flexibility to respond to new opportunities, and to partner more extensively with other community organizations in the future.

Just a few blocks from the WDRC's former offices, our new home will enable us to continue to meet Whatcom County's ongoing need for conflict prevention and intervention services.

RESILIENCE

Strengthening our internal and external resources to ensure a vibrant future

Thanks to support from the City of Bellingham, the WA State Department of Commerce, the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust, the Chuckanut Health Foundation, the First Federal Community Foundation, the RiverStyx Foundation, the Norcliffe Foundation, the McEachern Charitable Trust, the Jerry H. Walton Foundation, the Whatcom Community Foundation and its donor advised funds, the WDRC's staff and board, and dozens of community members, we raised over \$780,000 in just eight months!

We opened our doors at 206 Prospect Street on January 2nd, 2019.

While we successfully raised sufficient funds to renovate and relocate to our new building, we welcome additional contributions from the community to assist us with reducing our debt and establishing a capital projects fund.




