The Health Department requests an increase in spending authority to be used for facility improvements in a county owned building. The building is staffed and operated by Sun House, a community organization providing emergency housing for homeless individuals who have a mental illness diagnosis. This request was approved in 2022 budget supplemental (#3670), but the work was delayed and a contractor not yet secured.

County funding such as REET and EDI are not allowable for this project. These funds are flexible enough to allow for this improvement and the one-time cost of the building upgrade is less than the surplus revenue brought into the fund by unusually favorable market conditions in 2020 and 2021. Since the previous request was approved and budgeted for, the bulk of this request is still in the fund. This request is a higher due to increased costs in the project.

The new system is more energy efficient than the current failing radiator system. This is a reappropriation of the 2022 budget The East Whatcom Regional Resource Center (EWRRC) is heated by means of a single condensing boiler. The boiler is efficient and has reliability problems during cold weather. The boiler failed during an extreme cold snap in February 2017. When this single boiler goes down we are in danger of the building temperature falling below the freezing level which could cause significant issues and repair costs. This proposal would replace the single large condensing oiler with two smaller condensing boilers to five redundancy should one of the boilers fail during cold weather. The original boiler is oversized as it was intended to supply a second building as well. A single smaller boiler should be able to carry the load should one fail during winter.

The boilers are not operating efficiently or properly at the EWRRC and should be replaced. A failure of the existing boiler, resulting in a situation where the building is not heated, could cause catastrophic issues that would be substantial and costly
