#### **Committee Goals**

- Make it easier and safer for County residents to bike and walk for transportation and recreation
- Ensure County's Bicycle/Pedestrian Plan reflects current needs
- Speed up completion of priority bicycle/ped projects

- New priority project list
- Updating 2010 Pedestrian/Bicycle Plan
- Participating on ADA Study Team
- Proposal for Community Grant program
- Spot improvements idea
- Start tracking bicycle and pedestrian usage on County roads

# Three Trail Proposals Deserve Special Attention

- Nooksack Loop Trail (Bellingham to Ferndale)
- Blaine/Birch Bay Trail
- Kendall Connectivity Trail (State Route 547 Trail)

### Nooksack Loop Trail

- 45 mile trail connecting Bellingham, Ferndale, Lynden & Everson
- Over 100,000 people live within five miles of proposed trail corridor
- Whatcom County Parks & Rec Foundation has done work on this
- Existing opportunity for Port of Bellingham to open Airport Trail to public
- Lockwood property owned by City of Bellingham could provide connection from end of existing trail to Airport Trail
- Kope Road to Ferndale section next priority

## Nooksack Loop Trail





#### Blaine/Birch Bay Trail

- Would connect Birch Bay State Park and Peace Arch State Park (8.9 mi)
- No safe way to cycle or walk to local schools, parks, groceries, services
- Local trail committee has been working on this project
- Approved a park levy to fund trail development (70% voter approval)
- Have been purchasing easements and property for trail
- A few segments on County roadways, need support from Public Works
  - Harborview Hill Road
  - Crossing of California Creek

### **Kendall Connectivity Trail**

- Officially called State Route 547 Pedestrian & Bicycle Safety Trail (about 3 miles long); part of Bay-to-Baker Trail
- > 57 accidents involving bikes and peds, including two bicycle fatalities
- Elementary school prohibits children from cycling/walking to school because it isn't safe to do so
- On State ROW
- Kendall-Columbia Valley community has been advocating for this trail since 2013; broad community support

# Proposal: Community Grant (Small Projects) Program

- Encourage neighborhoods/community groups to make the case for small projects like crosswalks, short sections of bike lanes or sidewalks
- Reflect constantly changing needs
- Allow residents to have some ownership of the bicycle/pedestrian system
- Maximum project cost could be \$250K
- Select two or three projects for implementation each year
- Public Works would design and implement the projects

### **Spot Improvements**

Priority projects where right-of-way for a bike lane is lacking along much of the corridor (e.g., Northshore Drive)

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Funding the entire project may be prohibitive

May have short stretches where a climbing lane or other type of improvement could increase safety

Incremental improvements can make a difference



#### **Bike/Ped Counts**

- Bicycle and pedestrian usage on County roads not tracked
- No basis for comparing usage before and after improvements
- Propose to do an annual count on select County roads using volunteers
- Would be part of the WSDOT Bicycle and Pedestrian Documentation Project

#### Recommendations

- ► Hire an **Active Transportation Manager** in Public Works
- Decide which County department should have responsibility for trail development outside parks
- Speed up implementation of bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure by including additional projects in the Six Year TIP and annual construction budget
- Make the Pedestrian & Bicycle Plan dynamic by creating an annual fund for small community projects
