Clinical Nurse Educator with a focus on the unmet educational needs related to care of vulnerable populations across the PeaceHealth System. These include the development and delivery of courses such as Cultural Humility, ACEs and Trauma-Informed Care, Caring for Neurodivergent Patients, Managing Behaviorally Challenging Patients, and Human Trafficking. Additionally, delivery of internationally recognized courses of the Crisis Prevention Institute and its relationship to the Code Gray response. Actively partner with internal and community individuals and groups to strengthen the collective response to care of vulnerable populations, especially as they often present with difficult behaviors.

Worked on the inpatient Behavioral Health unit, caring for involuntary and voluntary psychiatric patients. Administered psychiatric medications to patients with various mental illnesses, including detox management. Monitored effects of psychiatric medications and general physical health of the patients. Worked collaboratively with a multi-disciplinary team of psychiatric health care providers. Served as a patient advocate. Encouraged adult patients to assume responsibility for their health care through illness and medication education, information about alternatives to medical therapies, and empowerment techniques.

Worked in the Specialized Emergency Care Unit to stabilize the medical and behavioral concerns, and then assisted with the discharge disposition.

Administered psychiatric medications to 14 severely psychologically and emotionally disturbed children admitted to the residential treatment facility. Monitored effects of psychiatric medications and general physical health of the children. Managed teams of 5 floor staff giving direct care in the milieu. Responsible for behavior management of the children including encouraging positive attention-seeking behaviors and appropriate anger management techniques, verbal de-escalation, and restraint and seclusion.

<u>United States Peace Corps, Ilam, Nepal</u>

Registered Nurse, Reproductive Health Specialist March 2001-August 2003

Conceptualized and developed a four-day reproductive health training for delivery to Nepali students in the 8th, 9th, and 10th grades and presented it to approximately 3,500 Nepali students over the course of a year and a half. Administered pre- and post-tests to track effectiveness of training. Worked with His Majesty's Government to ensure local support for the decimation of federally mandated but culturally sensitive information.

Conducted preliminary research on suicide statistics in Ilam, Nepal. Initiated mental health awareness project to educate the community about identification, care, treatment, referral system for mentally ill citizens. Designed a two-day mental illness educational training which was delivered to approximately 2,000 high school students, pharmacists, police personnel, and health care workers. Developed simple brochures about mental illness which were distributed at various farmers' markets across the district. Enlisted the aid of local volunteers for interest generation and information dissemination.

Into the chaos of the Emergency Department you come.

You did not choose your illness,

but I choose to be here.
